

GRAND HAVEN INVITATIONAL PALM COAST, FLORIDA OCTOBER 31-NOVEMBER 3, 2012

Welcome to the seventh annual Grand Haven invitational. The welcome mat was out, and the players were treated royally, as has been the custom during the previous years. A cold front (But we don't have cold fronts in Florida) went through Tuesday night, and left us with a clear sky and cool cold sunny days. The croquet committee,

The Avera – Palmer game was an interesting game to watch, it being a game dominated by six-ball deadness and an opponent with both balls for one-back. The general play showed a weakness of strategy by the players at this level. Dorthy Fosse, who turned 93 this week, was in the audience. She was saving herself for her tournament next spring.

Second flight had Marilyn Heberling besting Jenny Dees in the semi-final by one wicket, and going on to lose to Bob Crouch 18-10. Marilyn, who has played in this tournament most of the years, moved up from last year, taking second, rather than third. Bob Crouch, in his first tournament play now has something to live up to.
